Date or Period: ca. 1870

Original Use: Residence

Vicinity: Groveton

Pageland Farm is a two-story, frame house with a gabled roof and rear, interior, brick chimney. It has a two-story addition at the rear and a one-story addition on the south side. The farm also features a large, gambrel-roofed barn as well as several smaller frame buildings. A field on the east front of the house is known as the "old burial field," because unknown soldiers from the second battle of Manassas are said to have been buried there.
